Let's Win the CW All Asia Contest

Do you recall the immortal lyrics “Regrets? I’ve had a few...” from Frank Sinatra’s hit song “I Did It My Way”? Well, I, too, have a few regrets, and there is a particular one which just sticks in my craw! Way back in the days of NCCC’s infancy, back in the early 1970s, our club tried to win every single category which somebody in W6/W7-land could win in the CW All Asia Contest. Sadly, we failed because some non-NCCC person always picked us off in at least one of the categories. So recently I’ve been thinking ... after 40+ years wouldn’t it be sweet to finally achieve the goal that has always eluded us? Yes, I’m aware Mr. Sinatra continued his lyrics with the observation “Yes, there were times, I’m sure you knew, when I bit off more than I could chew...”, but what’s to be gained if we don’t try?

So, with the past in mind, let’s charge into the 2015 running of the CW All Asia Contest the weekend of June 20 and 21 (UTC). We won’t treat this as a Focus Contest for NCCC, but rather just as an operating event in which our twin objectives are to have fun and to achieve the Club Goal (explained below). If the CW AA Contest proves to be a hit, then perhaps we can consider doing it again for the SSB AA Contest which is the weekend of September 5 and 6.

The CW AA Contest has nine entry categories:

1. Single Op, Single Band 160m
2. Single Op, Single Band 80m
3. Single Op, Single Band 40m
4. Single Op, Single Band 20m
5. Single Op, Single Band 15m
6. Single Op, Single Band 10m
7. Single Op, All Bands
8. Multi Op, Single Transmitter
9. Multi Op, Multi Transmitter

The “Club Goal” is to win ALL nine of the categories for our area. Winning only eight or fewer doesn’t cut it and we fail, so NCCC participants must work together to ensure we are most effectively utilizing our operators and stations. “Our area” is recognized by the JARL (the AA sponsor) to be the USA portion of CQ Zone 3. That means to succeed we’ve got to beat all non-NCCC members in CA, AZ, NV, UT, OR, WA, and ID. Just think about who else lives in our area – contesters in

such places as Seattle, Los Angeles, San Diego, Phoenix and Salt Lake City – and it's easy to see that achieving our Club Goal of winning everything is not going to be easy. For us to succeed, we're going to need some serious, butt-in-chair operating.

The JARL does not include a team competition as part of the AA, so to make the contest more fun for us and to push each other to achieve the highest scores possible, NCCC will have its own internal competition. We will form two NCCC teams: Team A and Team B. (I'll gladly change those bland team names if somebody sends me two clever, Asian-ey sounding names to replace them. This is supposed to be fun, right?) NCCC members who want to participate on a team will need to register themselves and the category they wish to enter. To do that, go to the NCCC's home page (www.nccc.cc) and click on the "All Asia" link. That will take you to the registration form you'll need to fill out, and also give you a link to the full AA rules on the JARL's website. It's probably a good idea to actually read the rules before you commit yourself to an entry category! We're looking forward to getting you signed up for this fun contest soon.

Shortly before AA starts, a small committee will assign everyone who registered to a team. We'll make those assignments with an eye toward balancing the teams so they will be as competitive with each other as possible. And to make things even more fun, we will have a live scoreboard running during the AA so everybody can see in real time how their competitors are doing! We'll post details about how to log on to the live scoreboard as soon as we get it all figured out.

Team scores will be the sum of the "team points". Team points are NOT the same as the points you report when you submit your AA log to the JARL. Rather, they are based upon a percentage of the top NCCC score in each entry category. For example, assume the top NCCC scorer in the 10m single op category reports a score of 10,000 points to JARL. For our internal contest, that top score will be 100 percent, or 100 team points. If the next highest NCCC score in that category is 9,500 points, then that entrant will earn 95% or 95 team points. An NCCC team's score will be the sum of the team points accumulated by all of its members, with no one member's score exceeding 100 points. Think about that – the top scorer in any entry category will contribute just as many team points to his team as will the top scoring multi-multi station. Every entry category will be equally important to the final team score. This scoring method also prods each operator to stay in the chair and do his best because, even if he doesn't win his entry category, he can contribute a significant number of points to his team's overall score by making a large percentage of that category's winning score.

It might be that some entry categories just don't have much activity this year. That could happen perhaps on 160, 80 or even 10m. In such case, if nobody makes 10 or more QSOs, then everybody in that category will get a number of team points equal to the number of QSOs they make multiplied by ten. For example, if there are 3 entrants in the 160m single band, single op category and they make, say, 8, 7 and 2 QSOs respectively, then their team points will be 80, 70 and 20.

The All Asia contest runs for 48 hours. Put in full time if you wish, or select a category which better fits the time you have available. Single band 10m and 15m ops most likely only need to be in the chair for a few hours in the late afternoon and early evening. Similarly, 160m and 80m ops probably will vacuum up everybody there is to work on those bands just by being there a couple of hours around sunrise. And you don't need a monster station to do well. Almost everybody has one band that plays well. Enter as a single op on that band. There are not an infinite number of stations to work in the AA, so if you alternate between CQing and S&P, even a modest station will work most of the stations to be had on that band. And you are permitted to use packet cluster spots to make sure you don't miss anybody!

If you're an iron man and want to go for the Single Op, All Band honors, then you can count AA as one of your qualifying contests to get you into the WRTC in Germany in 2018. And if you win SOAB for our area, then the Japanese Minister for Internal Affairs and Communications will give you your own special certificate proclaiming how great you are. Wouldn't that be neat to have hanging on your wall?

As for our internal teams, we will recognize two achievements. An award will go to the team which wins more of the nine entry categories than does the other team; and another award will go to the team which makes the larger team score. Maybe the same team wins both of these awards ... or maybe not? At the time I'm writing this article, I have no idea what would be appropriate awards for the winning team(s). I thought about a case of beer, but where would we present it and how would we ever divide it up? So I solicit your suggestions ... please!

For a closing thought ... as the clock approaches the conclusion of the AA at 23:59Z on June 21, know that Frank Sinatra will be watching from above to see how you did. So push back from the operating table, take a deep breath, and belt it out for ole Blue Eyes:

“And now, the end is near;
And so I face the final curtain.
My friend, I'll say it clear,
I'll state my case, of which I'm certain.

I planned each charted course;
Each careful step along the byway,
And more, much more than this,
I won AA my way.”

Describe your antenna system:

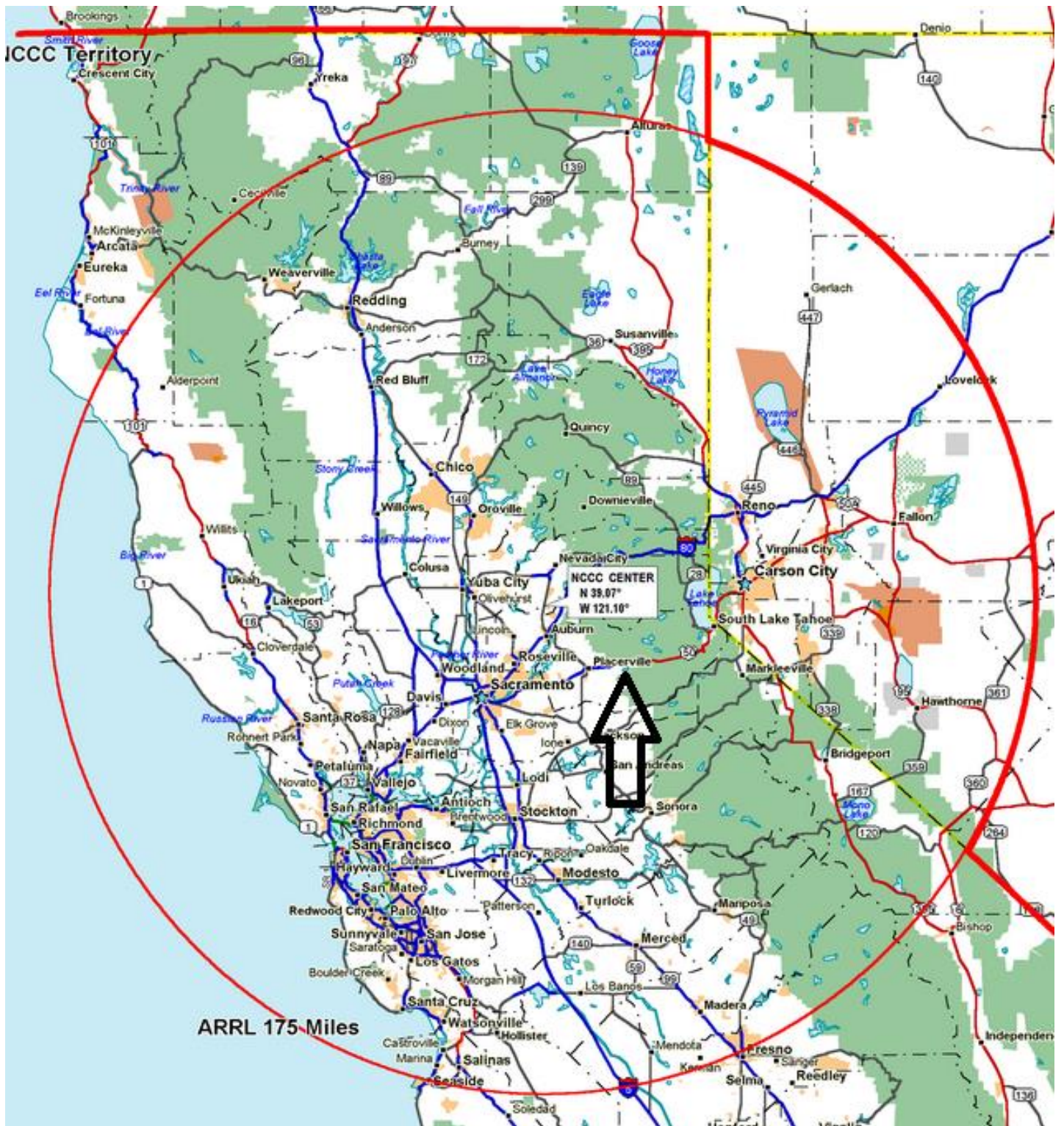
Current: I have a 6 band hex beam on a push-up mast currently at 20 feet, due to high wind damage to the pole, and a G5RV at 45 feet.

Future: I'm in the process of installing a 51 foot crank-up tower on which I will mount a 3-el Step-pIR with 40/30 dipole and an 80m dipole.

What's in your shack? I have a very simple shack. My main radio is a Yaesu FT-1000MP with a Yaesu FL-7000 Linear Amplifier. I have a Timewave Navigator for digital work that I am just setting up. I also have a Yaesu FT-450 and a FT-8800, for local club nets and emergencies.

What are your previous QTH's? We moved to this QTH in 2010 from Torrance, CA. I was first licensed in 2011, so this is the only QTH where I have operated from.

If you're working, what is your career? If not, what was your career? I retired, with 11 years, from Southern California Edison where I was a senior operations manager. 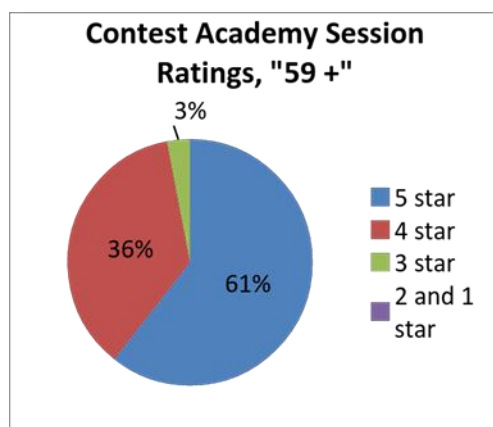

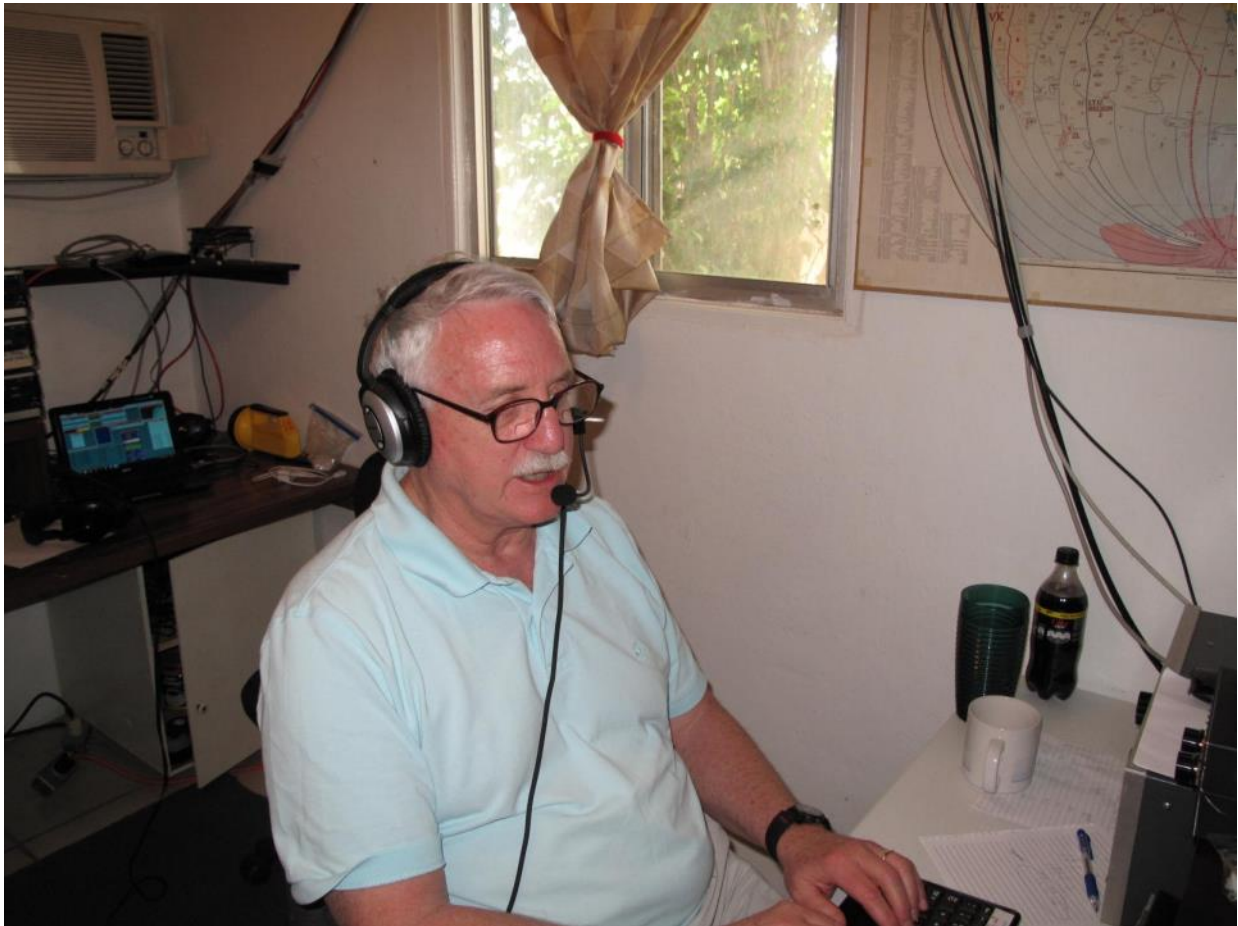

Musings of a First Time Contester at P49Y

When Andy Faber (AE6Y) invited me to join him in Aruba to operate in the ARRL DX SSB Contest at P49Y, I was both nervous and excited. Although I have been an avid DXer for many years, my contesting had been limited to searching the bands looking for "new ones". Not once had I ever called "CQ" during a contest, much less been on the DX side of a pileup. The chance to actually "be" DX was just too much to pass up - especially since Andy implied this would be a "low key" operation. My fear and trepidation increased greatly some weeks later when Andy informed me our team had been expanded to include Scott Redd (K0DQ) and Ed Giambastiani (N4OC), both of whom, in addition to Andy, are highly seasoned and well respected contesters. I felt like I had been invited to play in an NBA basketball game with three All Stars, yet I could not make the High School JV team. The pressure was on!

Two days before we were scheduled to leave for Aruba it seemed like a good idea to find my passport. Having located the document, I was both shocked and relieved to find the passport had expired several weeks earlier. There it was - my "out". I simply could not make the trip without a valid passport. Having practiced law with Andy for some 25 or more years, I knew how thorough and resourceful he could be. So, before I could employ my "passport excuse" I needed to do some due diligence so I could tell Andy I had tried, but was unable, to renew my passport on such short notice. I soon learned the Internet can be an awful resource, because there are companies which can help you renew an expired passport in as little as 24 hours. I had 48. Yikes!

Well, with my passport renewed and a rescheduled flight, I was on my way to Aruba. By the time I arrived, Andy, Scott and Ed had configured the station for a "multi-two" operation - whatever that meant. Andy gave me a crash course in contesting. I was able to assimilate about 5 percent of what was undoubtedly a wealth of contesting knowledge. I finally asked him to just tell me how to enter a call sign into the logging software and use the DVR in the K3 to send CQ. The rest I would try to figure out as the contest went on.

We agreed to operate in shifts. When Andy said he was ready for a break and my shift was about to begin, the butterflies really started to swarm. As I sat in front of the rig and called "CQ Papa Forty-Nine Yankee" it sounded like the entire world was talking at once. After what seemed like an eternity, I was able to make out a call sign and log a contact. My first thought was - "I'm going to Bouvet!" Well, not really, but I did think "I can do this". Soon my four hour shift was about over and I was ready for a break. I wondered - how can anyone possibly operate for 48 hours straight? After a short nap, I was ready for my second shift, then another, and another. I found myself looking forward to each shift and really enjoyed running the pileups. It was clear this could be addicting. The contest went by far too quickly and I was sad it was over.

Lessons learned (obvious to any experienced contester) included being efficient – don't say "thanks and 73 - QRZ?". Instead, simply say "QRZ" or "P49Y". If you are able to pick out a partial call, say "AE6?". Once the station replies with "Yankee" it is unnecessary to reply "AE6Y, roger"; Instead say "Yankee, thanks" because AE6Y already knows you had AE6 and were only missing "Y". Then, move on.

It is better to call CQ in some places than others. For example, many folks won't tune to the top end of the band so it's better to stay lower. On the other hand, don't limit yourself to the Extra portion of the band either, because that would exclude all those with General, Technician or Novice Class licenses.

Learn to type partial calls into the logging software. Don't wait until you get the full call before you start typing. It saves time!

Practice! This includes using the logging software, calling CQ, and operating the equipment at the contest station. It amazing how much more comfortable, and efficient, I became as the contest progressed once I became more familiar with the whole process. Repetition increases speed and accuracy.

Use headphones that eliminate extraneous noises. It is more difficult to make out calls if there is excess background noise. Also, make sure you have a comfortable chair – especially if you plan to be at the radio for hours at a time.

Be familiar with the contest rules, especially the multipliers, so you will recognize important prefixes. Know the required abbreviations for entry into the logging software.

Select a contest that makes sense for you. While I spend 95 percent of my operating time on CW, my skills could use considerable improvement. I would have been overwhelmed as a first time contester in CQWW CW, for example. It was no accident I picked a sideband contest for my maiden voyage into the sea of contesting.

Have an operating plan before you start! It is much easier than trying to figure out what to do next during the contest. A little planning will go a long way and make the experience more fun and, for me at least, that was the whole point.

If they were, it never showed. To the contrary, they were very supportive and offered helpful suggestions in just the right amount and at exactly the right time. Watching three such experienced contesters in action was a big thrill, not to mention educational. I learned a great deal - especially that there is so much to being a good contesteer!

In the end, I needn't have worried. Andy, Scott and Ed were the finest of "Elmers". I really enjoyed the experience! And to think, I almost backed out!"
