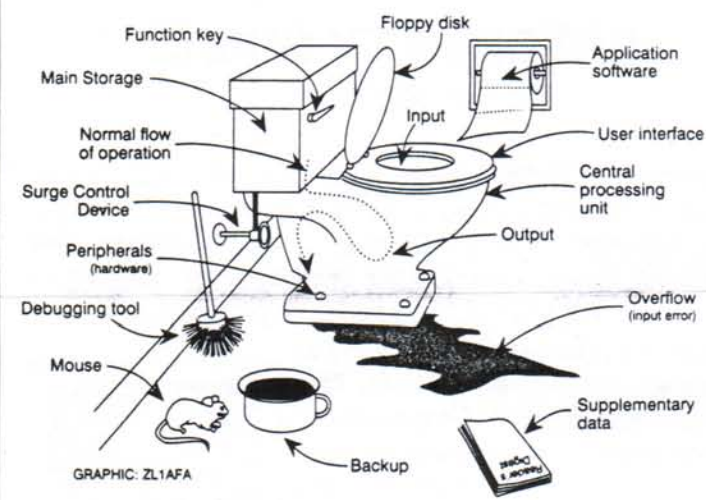

OURS IS BUT TO DO OR DIE * DE N6IP AND *A.L. TENNYSON

Until a newly formed, aggressive contest club focused its energy and resources on SS, the contest was dominated by the Potomac Valley Radio Club, who had won 27 out of the 28 runnings from 1946 to 1973. The new dominant force, the Northern California Contest Club, targeted SS from 1975 to 1980 and won first place, unlimited club competition, all six years. NCCC holds the records for high club score and log submissions which it set during this period.

Demoralized by the strength of the west coast competitors, east coasters abandoned SS in droves. Activity measured by log submissions dropped throughout the 80s until new operating incentives were offered by the ARRL. Dying patient SS roared back to life in 1990 and held strong in 1991. Additional incentives from Newington coupled with a concerted NCCC effort means the participation level will set a new record in 1992. NCCC will both cause and become the chief benefactor of the increased participation, which will allow another righteous first place finish in SS.

Gunning for the Gavel

Between the time amateur radio was reactivated after W.W.II and the early 70s, SS club competition was quite dull. After all, PVRC "always" won. Oblivious to the obvious, especially the fact that west coast groups certainly had no chance at the national title, the young Northern California Contest Club decided to mount an all-out effort in the 1975 SS.

The effort paid off. NCCC's 128 logs totaling 9,561,630 points, won the 1975 SS Club Competition, becoming the first west coast club winner. Although QST practically ignored the feat in their May, 1976 write-up, NCCC decided to go for the 1976 SS as well. This time, 136 logs and 10,884,632 points won gavel #2 for NCCC. Again in 1977, NCCC conquered with a new high score, even though activity was down a bit. The 1978 club really outdid themselves. As documented in QST, April, 1979, NCCC had 70% of the membership active in SS and submitting logs (without computer assistance, either—remember manual dupe sheets?). The old club score record was decimated, with 14,874,540 total points. Our average entry was 106,000 points; compare this with the national high scoring CW operator achieving 188k, and high phone only got 334k. A fantastic NCCC performance!

1979 was the culmination of NCCC's SS dominance. 144 logs totaling 15.1M club points stands as the all-time record. You won't find this score documented in QST, however. Journalistic bungling misplaced six logs, so the May, 1980 issue shows only 14.5M points, which was still double that of the second place entry and plenty for gavel number five.

NCCC SS Accomplishments

- Record High Club Score (15.1M)
- Record Number of Logs Submitted (144)
- NCCC Wins SS Every Year We Focus on it (7/7)
- 70% Membership Turnout for the record setting '78 & '79 Contests (With an average score of >100k Points!)
- Took Second place, medium club category last year (even while CQWW was our club goal.)

Starting in 1980, dissent grew among the membership about continued emphasis on SS. "...the club needs something more of a challenge than beating PVRC for the 'Nth' time in a row. It's too easy"-N6KT. Just over half of the members wanted to go for gavel six, which was easily brought home with 113 logs totaling 10.8M points.

Between 1981 and 1983, CQWW was our major operating event. In 1984, NCCC again wanted the gavel. SS was given full attention and gavel #7 was ours.

The Decline of SS

Devastated by the overwhelming dominance of their west coast competition, the east coast SSers lost their will to live and abandoned

NCCC National Rank, 1971-1991

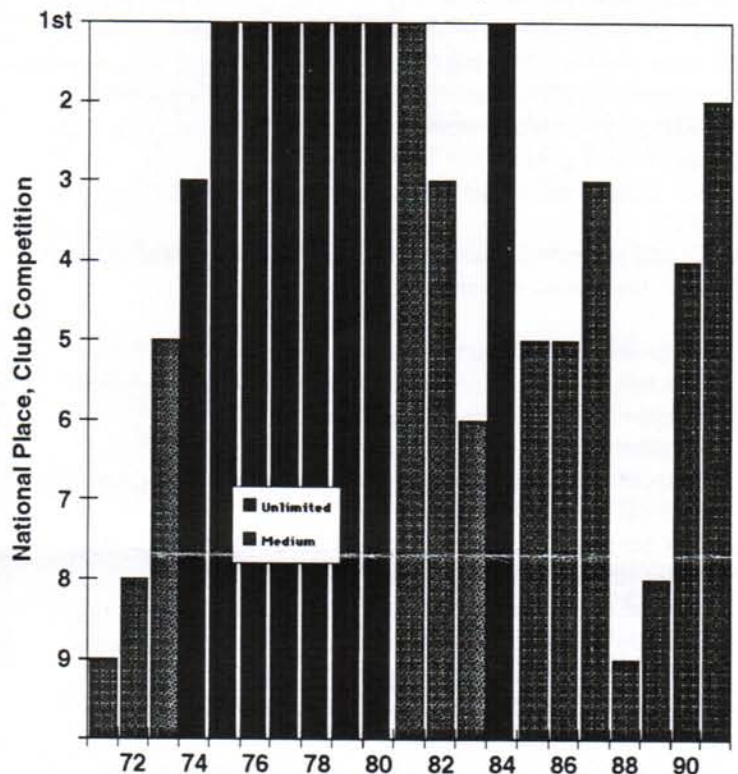


Figure 1. NCCC National Placement, SS Club Competition.

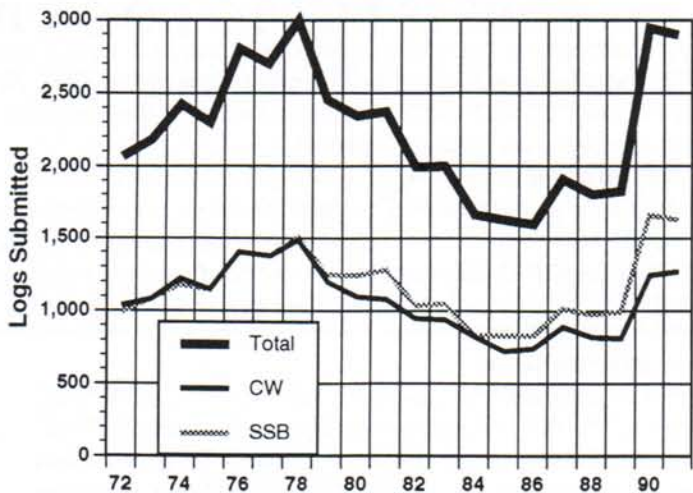


Figure 2. Sweepstakes Logs Submitted, Nationally, by Mode.

SS. Refer to Figure 2. Note the precipitous drop in log submissions between 1979 and 1989. High scores plateaued (see Figures 5 and 6) during this period and SS was considered a dying contest. The ARRL responded with operating incentives in 1990: a lapel pin for 100 contacts began in 1990, a "clean sweep" mug was added in 1991, and a plaque program begins this year. The incentives have been a huge success, with log submissions spurring up significantly. In fact, the 1990 and 1991 total entries were within an "NCCC" of the all time record year of 1978. This means that if NCCC had targeted SS in either of the past two years, a new participation record would have been set. Now that SS is our official "major operating event", 1992 will certainly be a record-breaking year. SS has revived.

What does all this mean?

Simply stated, NCCC has the experience and resources to KB in SS. 1992 is the first time since 1984 that NCCC is emphasizing SS, and as our seven-for-seven track record shows, victory is very achievable. We have focused on CQWW for the past several years, effectively eliminating the competitive possibility of an SS effort, since running major contests back-to-back for a month would drain the best of you, and kill the rest of us!

Our Job

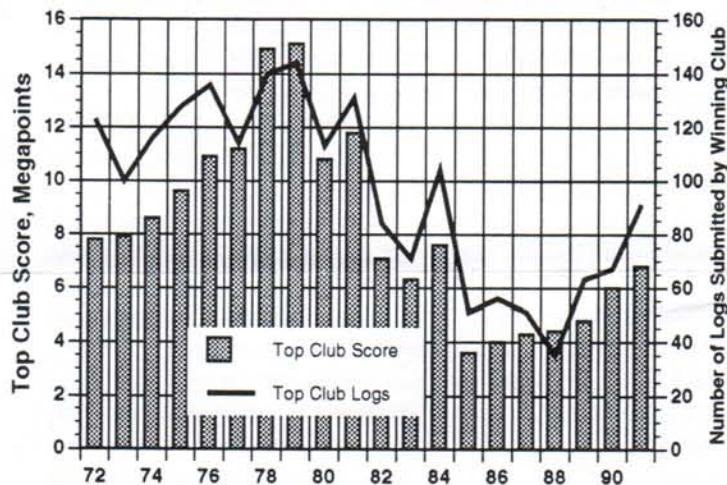


Figure 3. First Place Club Score & Number of Logs Submitted.

Reviewing SS club results, shown in Figure 3, I believe a ten megapoint effort would guarantee victory. Assuming a 100k point average entry, that translates to one hundred logs, combined CW and phone. Assuming 25 members submit for both phone and CW, we need only 75 participants—about half our membership. Every bit helps, especially in a low-scoring contest like SS, where the average-to-high score ratio is extremely low.

100k Quota

The big guns will easily exceed this figure, and the medium guns can reach it with only slight difficulty. What about the "pistols"? Aim for a personal best. The crucial point is this: we need your participation. The big guns cannot win it alone. We need lots of logs, large and small. Remember our record setting 70% participation efforts in '78 and '79. As incentive, (as if you needed further incentive), NCCC offers three awards. The prestigious KB-2000 plaque goes to all members making 2000 or more QSOs (combined, CW + phone). The KB-1000 is awarded to all members totaling 1000 combined Qs. The "Jughead" award goes to the station contacting the most NCCC members. Don't repaint your shack; refinish it with NCCC wood or wallpaper!

NCCC will enter the Unlimited Club category. Price of admission is 50 logs. There is no maximum.

Distinctive SS Characteristics

- SS is by nature a low scoring contest, with only 77 possible multipliers and a "once-per-weekend" dupe rule (Persistence pays)
- Competition between the Top Ten is extremely tight (Just ask N6KT about last year)
- High Score and Average Scores are tightly distributed. The winner simply does not leave the pack back in the dust. (Several medium entries are much better than one large one)
- High Power categories beat 100W & QRP scores by a large margin, on both modes (Run your Amplifier)
- High Scoring Single Ops usually out-score High Scoring Multi-ops (Run Single Op)
- SS Activity correlates with ARRL-offered incentives, and this year there are several goodies available to participants (The more, the merrier)
- SS Activity is Increasing (1992 Should bring new entry records)

NCCC Needs YOU!

NCCC #1 in SS sure has a nice sound, doesn't it? Given our track record, we CAN DO, but with ACTION, not just words. Let's continue the 100% correlation between NCCC emphasizing SS and NCCC winning SS. Get your signal on the air in both CW and phone weekends. After all, as WB6CEP (now N6OP) writes in the December, 1975 JUG, "...an anonymous East Coaster said to the biggest, (?—ed.) meanest, ugliest SSB-hater of them all (W6RGG), 'Jesus, if they got you on phone, they have to be going all out'". More recently, N6TV purchased the K1EA Digital Voice Processor just so he can operate phone SS. And Bob is reportedly helping Rich, N6KT, with his code speed. If these guys can leave their native mode, everybody can.

The Single Op graphs (Figures 5 and 6) show that the high power entries consistently out-score their low-power counterparts. If you have an amplifier, use it.

Total SS Logs Submitted, '72-'91

Winning Club Score and Total Club Logs Submitted, '72-'91

NCCC SS Entries, '72-'91

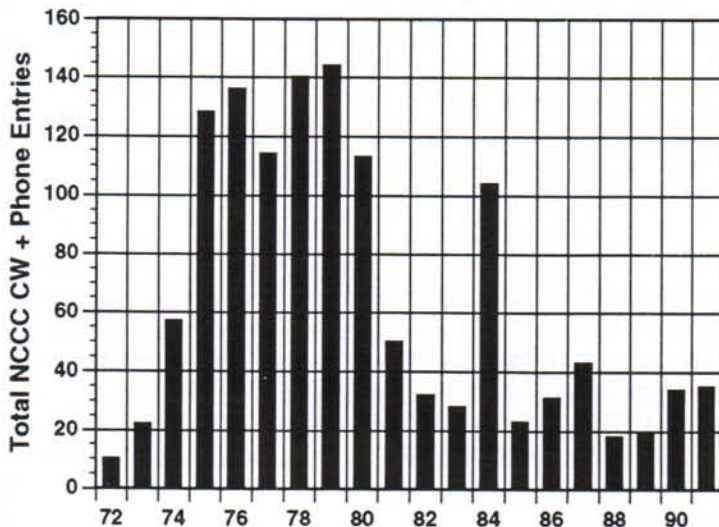


Figure 4. Logs Submitted by NCCC.

SS High Score, Single Operator CW '72-'91

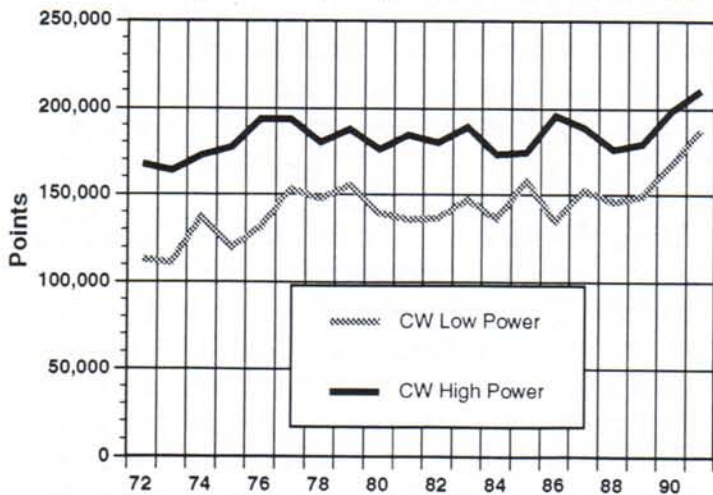


Figure 5. High Scoring Single Operator, CW, by Year.

SS High Score, Single Operator Phone '72-'91

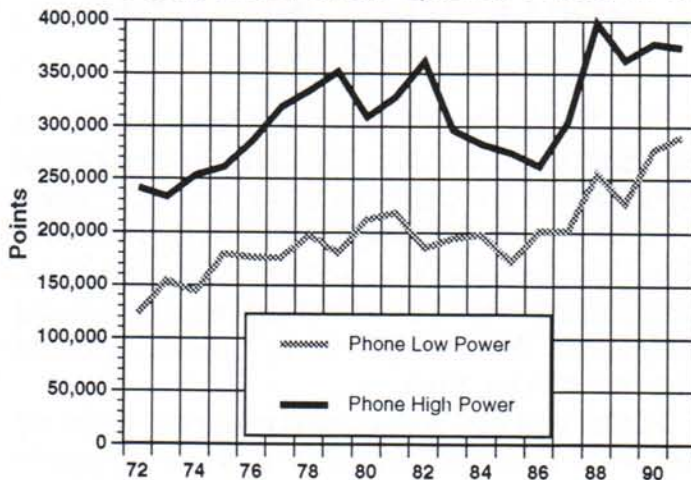


Figure 6. High Scoring Single Operator, Phone, by Year.

Since SS is a low scoring contest, with a maximum of 77 total multipliers and a "once-per-weekend" dupe rule, you need persistence to succeed. Mults are extremely important, much more so than in DX contests, so you should spend a bit more time fighting for them. The long exchange reduces rates; don't expect a 300/hour rate, and don't be disappointed with a 60/hour overall average. That would total 1440 Qs—enough to beat WN4KKN's first place 1367 contacts in last year's SS.

To meet your quota, you will need 667 Qs and 75 multipliers or 650 Qs and a clean sweep (77 mults). You only must maintain the "astronomical" (NOT!) rate of 27 an hour for the 24 out of 30 hour period to accomplish this. No problem!

Make sure you work all fellow NCCC members. As N6TV reminds, when NCCers work, it's "two for us, none for 'them'".

After the dust settles, please make sure your effort counts by submitting your log. Send me a copy of your summary sheets by 15 December, and postmark the full log to Newington by 22 December. If you are a terrible procrastinator, get your duped log to N6IP and I'll mail it for you. Do not forget to write:

"Club participation: Northern California Contest Club" on the summary sheet.

Help NCCC Win SS

- Enter Both Modes
- Enter as a Single Op
- Enter High Power Category
- WORK ALL NCCC MEMBERS ("Two for Us, NONE for Them")
- Ensure your log summary sheet specifies "Club Participation: Northern California Contest Club"
- Submit your summary sheet to N6IP before 15 December
- Postmark your log to ARRL before 22 December

Bottom Line: if you only follow one bit of my advice, let it be this—Get on the air and OPERATE!

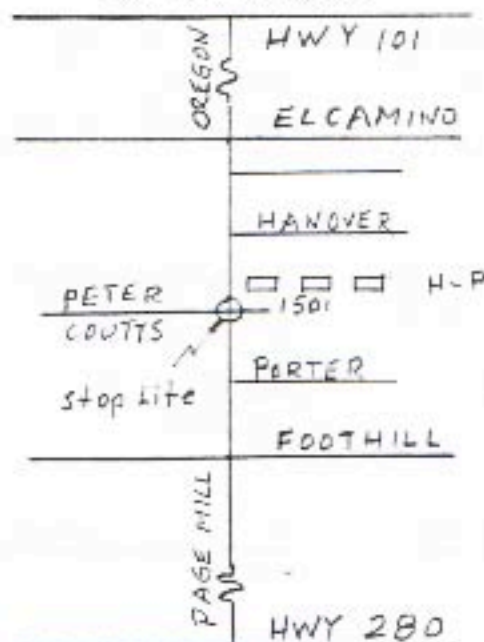

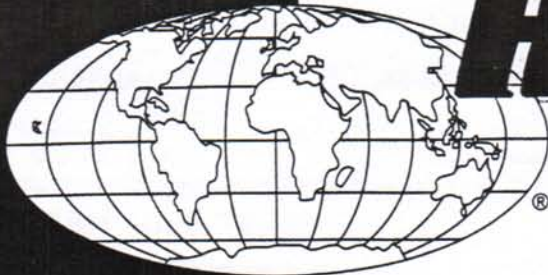
