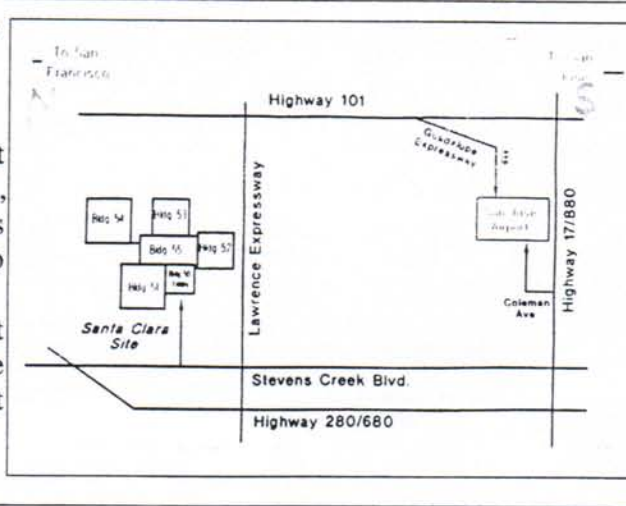

Getting Ready for the Big One

SWEEPSTAKES is only about seven months away. A long way say you? Not. Consider this. In 1992 NCCC won SS with 91 logs and 9.1 milliyun points. Yankee Clipper Contest Club was second with 52 logs and the huge Frankort Radio Club was third with 70 logs. Both those clubs have more members than NCCC. We won because we turned out more stations. Right. But for how long? Those clubs, plus the mighty PVRC, are after US, and the first two can whip us if they get half their members on the air! We're gonna hafta work hard and harder.

A couple of ideas have been rumbling around in the editor side of my head and I'm going to run 'em by you, not just for consideration, but for action. Maybe we can pool ideas, technology, experience that has worked well. Formulate a strategy to hold the top spot. That means we want to hear from you--and you too.

First step. Begin thinking of improvements in our stations, operating techniques, plans, etc. Take the next few months to get your station and rig in peak condition. Check out all the gadgets and be sure they put out to the max. Get used to the new stuff you're going to use. Surprizes during the contest are not usually fun.

Second, the VP/Contest Chairman, appoints himself, or someone else, or both, to be Coordinator of SS Affairs. Why just SS? Because it's the contest we have the best chance of winning for the next several years. The coordinator can arrange talks at meetings, short articles in the JUG, and act as a source for tips and ideas.

Much of what can be said for SS applies to DX and other contests as well. From a membership like ours, we ought to be able to create a handbook of info for

contest operators.

For those who don't read every portentous word of the JUG, we're looking to you, Big and Small Gun alike, for information, how you do your contest thing. We'll publish it. The pay ain't great, but we guarantee you'll be read, and even argued with!

ARRL DX CONTEST PHONE

I spent about 20 hours on in the ARRL SSB DX contest. Some random thought

a) The effect of worse conditions can be seen by comparing my score this year with the '92 ARRL CW contest. This year, I got 669 Q's and 175 multipliers. In '92, with fabulous conditions, I got 862 Q's and 224 mults (without packet), using only an R5 vertical and a 20'-high 40m dipole (before my neighbors and I discovered Force 12, hi). Main difference was no Eu opening on 10, and condx not quite good enough for me to run Eu's on 15 or 20. Result, missed a lot of countries eith low-power guys who answer East Coast but don't CQ themselves. Compare mult s in 1992 on 10-15-20 of 72, 55, 53 with '94 of 25, 69, 42.

b) It was a pleasure to listen to the nonsense operating style of Dave, W6QHS, and Carl, AI6V, at P40V. They must subscribe to the N6TV theory of no wasted words, just send your call and wait for the next one, hi.

c) Very frustrating that so many South American ops will send "QRZ" over and over as long as people keep calling, without giving their calls. It doesn't affect their rates, but the rest of us waste a lot of time listening for ID.

d) I got a good JA run Friday and Saturday. JA's are terrific operators. They repeat just the proper parts of their calls, don't call out of turn, and vary the phonetics if necessary. Got called by a couple of fledgeling BV's and BY's who were much less slick. One BY kept giving me "59 24" as the report. I tried to explain I needed their power, not their zone, but finally gave up and wrote

down 24 as the power (maybe it was— others continued the tradition of strange power levels, such as 249, 90, and 111).

e) The strangest thing I heard was in the PY0FM pileup on 15 meters on Saturday. He was calling for "last letter ocean only", and a K8 kept QRM'ing with his call. The PY0 acknowledged the K8, but insisted he was calling for ocean only. The K8 then said, "OK, K8—, I'm near the ocean in Florida." When another station asked him to stop wasting the PY0's time, the K8 replied that the PY0 was wasting his time, he'd been calling for 15 minutes, the PY0 has an attitude problem, etc., etc. In desperation, the PY0 worked the K8, giving him a "50" instead of "59" report—and hopefully didn't put him in the log.

f) The only other intentional bad manners I heard was a South American who came right on top of PR0R on 15 and kept telling him to stop transmitting and adjust his xmtr, because he was splattering all over the band and ruining it for all of South America. This went on for several minutes in Spanish and English, and may have kept up for hours for all I know (I left after digging the PR0R out from under this guy). I didn't hear any such splatter on PR0R, though some dx stations had their processors so badly adjusted as to be almost unreadable.

g) The new (used) Ten-Tec Titan is a great improvement over the old Henry 2KD: runs cooler, easier to tune and band-change, and the peak reading bar graph much more comforting that a meter that reads the low average of SSB output.

h) While we may suffer from not having easy access to Europe as the East Coast, at least everyone recognizes the state name "California" without repeats (if coupled to a "6" call sign), unlike guys who have to give states over and over.

Looking Ahead

DAYTON, one of the unique phenomena of Amateur Radio is coming up next, in just a few weeks. Someone always asks "What's the Big Deal about Dayton? Why does everybody talk about it and want to go? What's it like?" Hard to explain.

Some time ago, however, I stumbled onto a source that carries the answers to all those such questions, plus an account of it that's almost as good as being there. The article I'm referring to is from *Scuttlebutt*, the Yankee Clipper Contest Club newsletter, New England, USA.

Doug Grant K1DG, writes therein annually, an account of what it was like, fully capturing the color and spirit of the Dayton phenomenon. Sort of a once-yearly installment of Ham Adventure to OZ, both humorous and informative. He includes names and comments, all the Biggies who attend, including some of our own.

TO MY NEIGHBORS NOTICE CONCERNING ALLEGED TV INTERFERENCE FROM THIS STATION.

1. You have called to my attention the fact that transmissions from this station are causing interference to your TV reception.

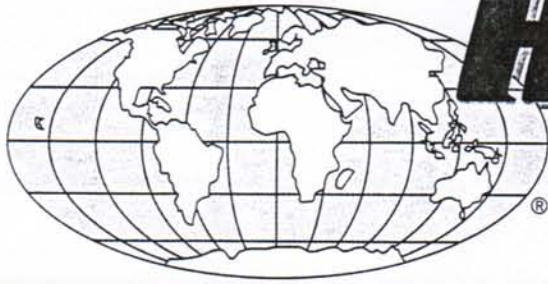
New Posts

The All-Important Beacon

The W6WX/B beacon station is relocated now atop Mt. QHS, aka Mt. Umunum, about a half mile south of W6QHS. It is at the site of group W6YCYZ, directed by Lance Ginner, K6GSJ, (You may know him as Dr Fire at Visalia last year.) You are all aware of the one minute power-stepping dash format. (100w - 10w - 1w - 0.1w) Transmission lasts one minute, then flips to 21.150 for a 10 second transmission, and immediately thereafter to 28.200 of another 10 second transmission. Thanks to K6LM, K6ILM KB6NAN and others who reported on two meters that the beacon was being heard throughout the Bay Area.

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
